During this month of celebration, American Legion Family members are encouraged to show their local communities the Legion's commitment to young people by hosting youth activities or by becoming involved in programs and organizations that support young

As Americans, we need to remember amid the problems we face daily with the environment, crime, unemployment and financial uncertainty, the one constant that will make or break this nation is our young people. They are our FUTURE! Our hopes and dreams for a better tomorrow rest in their hands.



Whatever event you host or participate in as a Legion Family, remember to invite local leaders and officials to the post to discuss the challenges facing children, families and the community, as well as share ideas for addressing those issues. Plan an event and engage the media in publicity and promotion.

Legion Family members can promote Children & Youth Month awareness through their local newspapers, radio and TV stations, civic groups, schools, social media, and in conversations with other veterans and their families. Communities need to know that American Legion services are available and why young people matter so much to us. Also, invite a subject-matter expert on child safety, health and education to present at a post event. And make any post event in April an opportunity to raise funds for Legion programs that support children and youth, such as the Temporary Financial Assistance program and the Child Welfare Foundation.

Following the observance of Children and Youth Month, the C&Y Chairman need to turn their attention to the annual reporting of expenditures and activities. Accurate records are important on money spent for the benefit of children and youth by your post/unit. Shortly after the first of the year, American Legion receives copies of the Consolidated Post Report (CPR). This form provides much needed information about the Legion's total

That each year our Legion Service Officers from all of our State Departments meet in Washington, D.C. for training? For three days they are furnished with a wealth of information from The National Veterans Legal Services Program and Department of Veterans Affairs sections including the Veterans Benefits Administration, Veterans Health Administration and the National Cemetery Administration. This training is sponsored by the American Legion VA&R Washington office. Following that most of us also attend the annual DC conference. Here are some of the highlight:

- The Veterans Administration estimates it will process 1.4 million disability claims this year.
- The VA expects an avalanche of appeals and will be asking Congress for money to hire almost 700 new employees at the Bd. Of Veterans Appeals.
- The Legion represents 12% of all appealed claims and currently has a caseload of 8,500.
- The VA will treat over 35,000 patients with Hepatitis C and new drugs will be able to cure 95% of them. It is estimated that 5% of all VA patients have Hep. C and most don't know it. Get tested.
- New National Cemeteries will be built in Western NY and Southern Colorado.
- There are still over 250,000 dependency claims pending, some going back 2-3 years.
- The VA has rolled out its National Work Queue. VA offices that are underutilized will get cases from other offices with too many cases. This will make dramatic improvements in timeliness.
- Veterans are still hurting their fellow veterans by NOT showing up for their hospital appointments and not notifying the VA. These slots could have been filled by another veteran.
- Rules will be changing under the VA's non-service connected pension programs. There will be a look back period on asset transfer to families and friends and certain trusts and annuities will no longer be allowed to hide assets. NOTE-these changes will NOT affect service-connected compensation payments.
- At the VA National Cemeteries 74% of the employees are veterans and of those 28% are service-connected disabled.
- Korean and Vietnam era veteran's claims usually had 2-3 conditions claimed; current Gulf War era veterans average 10 or more conditions.
- Although there are claims which take much longer, the average veteran now waits only 91 days for a decision.
- Coming: although veterans can't reserve a burial space in a National Cemetery yet they soon will be able to determine eligibility ahead of time so that when that time comes their service data will have already been approved.
- The Chicago area has been approved for an urban cemetery to consist of cremated remains however they still haven't found any vacant land within their budget. In other words the land is too expensive.



National Guard & Reserve Eligibility

The National Guard and Reserves are required to meet the same eligibility requirements as the full time federal active veterans. To be eligible, the National Guardsman/Reservist must have served at least one day on federal active duty during any of the delimiting periods set forth in Article IV, Section 1 of the National Constitution, and either have an honorable discharge or currently be serving either in the National Guard or Reserves on federal active duty.

The key to determining if a Guardsman/Reservist has been on or currently serving on federal active duty is the "Authority Line" on the activation orders of the Guardsman/Reservist. In both cases "Title 10, Subsection 672 or 12301" are orders from the Secretary of Defense and are federal orders. Basic Training and Advanced Training on federal installations IS federal active duty.

The authority the Governor uses to activate the National Guard as an individual or unit is "Title 32" orders, i.e., Weekend Drills and Annual Training. These are <u>not</u> federal orders. The Reserves have similar reserve orders which are "Title 10, Subsection 270." This authority code gives the reserve component the authority to active the reserves for Weekend Drills and Annual Training.

Use the chart below when determining eligibility for National Guard and Reserves.

* This Subsection was created following Desert Storm to replace 672.

This information was taken from Military Law Chapter 39.

Note: A DD-214 will be issued for the time on federal active duty or a DA-1059 for a completion of a school will be issued with a character type of discharge. All Reserve components send their service members to "Basic Training" using Title 10, Subsection 672/12301 orders.

National Guard & Reserve Recruiting

New member acquisition is essential in order for us to grow and prosper as an organization. With this in mind, one market area that has gone virtually untouched is the National Guard and Reserve. These military organizations are laced with eligible veterans who may have an interest in becoming members of The American Legion, but have not done so because they have not been asked or are unaware of what we do, and have done, on behalf of all veterans. Many of these veterans have chosen to affiliate with reserve components due to the downsizing of the active military. The great majority of National Guard and Reserve personnel have served on federal active duty, and as a result, the membership potential is great. From the statistical information provided by the VA, we know there are over 27 million veterans and the challenge we are faced with is to make contact and recruit eligible veterans. Over the past several years we have learned that acquiring new members is becoming more and more difficult. We must look beyond traditional methods of recruiting. This is a potential marketplace with a captive audience--veterans.

Legion launches new-look National website

The American Legion's national website, <u>www.legion.org</u>, has undergone an extreme makeover.

Redesigned and coded to look and perform better on mobile devices and to improve awareness of the Legion's valuable programs and services, the site maintains nearly all the features visitors have enjoyed and used in recent years while bringing forward easy-to-navigate and well-illustrated portals to join, renew, donate, purchase merchandise and learn more about the nation's largest veterans service organization. While the previous site design was guided primarily by news and promotions on the first landing page, the new architecture brings forward a brightly designed


storefront to better acquaint first-time and infrequent visitors with the Legion and its role in society.

For regular visitors, the site still has all the important information, including news headlines high on the and separate news landing a at www.legion.org/news where coverage of Legion activities can be found, along with photo galleries and videos. Redesigned hubs within the site include a new presentation to describe the organization and its mission at www.legion.org/about and a fresh design to promote the Legion's programs at www.legion.org/programs. The benefits of membership are laid out in a simple and inviting format at www.legion.org/members and all the latest media produced by National Headquarters, as well as tools for posts and departments to share with local media are at www.legion.org/media.

"The new design and functions of legion.org are more in tune with the growing percentage of people who click on the site from smartphones," American Legion Media & Communications Commission Chairman Walter Ivie explained. "The site is coded in a card format, meaning each story, video and photo flow nicely from top to bottom when you visit it from a phone or electronic tablet. The site is now really image-driven, and that helps visitors better understand what we do as an organization and why it matters."

Ivie said division staff consulted with post-9/11 generation veterans to improve the user experience for younger members and friends of the Legion. The site also continues to provide valuable access to MyLegion.org, the organization's membership-management portal, which generates substantially improved results for posts looking to convert National Headquarters members into local Legionnaires, and to find former members who have not yet renewed.





The site also makes tax-deductible giving easy via www.legion.org/donate where visitors can help The American Legion fulfill its mission to serve veterans, military personnel, youth and communities worldwide.

"One of the most important aspects of the new web design and architecture is that it always puts The American Legion's most important purposes front and center," Ivie said. "When the site is loaded with news stories, sometimes the Legion's over-arching purpose gets lost. The new design keeps the identity of the Legion clear at all times, while at the same time covering all the news in the headlines and the news center hub."

Ivie explained that the site will continue to evolve but will maintain a more consistent structure so changes can be made more quickly and efficiently.

Legion.org is one of the most accessed website for veterans, with between 300,000 and 500,000 unique visitors a month. Additionally, the Legion's Facebook and Twitter followings exceed 150,000. The weekly American Legion Online Update e-newsletter and the National Commander's twice-monthly email reach audiences of more than 600,000 subscribers each.

"The American Legion's national media program continues to grow and change to meet the interests of today's members and visitors," Ivie said. "National media products and services are vital to keep members and the public informed and to provide easy ways to conduct transactions online. To stay vital, we have to always be working to keep up with changing technology and ways people use media. It's all about keeping the membership informed and helping everyone understand the Legion and all it does. I invite members and non-members alike to get on legion.org and click through the pages, watch the videos and enjoy the photos."




