THE AMOUNT OF MONEY SPENT ON THE COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECT FOR THIS AWARD IS SECONDARY TO THE PROJECT. WHAT THE POST DOES IN AND FOR THE COMMUNITY IS THE KEY FACTOR! (use helpful service forms provided)

There are four First Place awards. They are; 15—100 members, 101—200 members, 201—400 members and 401 and up. This makes it easier for the small posts to compete. Each entry will receive a Certificate of Participation.

Entries are based on the size of your Post as of Department close of books for 2017 15 - 100 MEMBERS 101 - 200 MEMBERS 201 - 400 MEMBERS 401 + MEMBERS

- ★ ALL NEWSLETTERS— (other than newsprint) Enter according to the type of newsletter you publish.
- * NEWSPRINT— Issues printed on newspaper quality paper.
- ★ Only one newsletter category per post; however, you can also enter the Post Scrapbook category.
- Only one copy of 3 separate issues may be submitted. More or Less than 3 issues will disqualify entry.
- Judging is based on general content, Legion program news, originality, art, composition and general appearance.
- * **SCRAPBOOK** Must be composed of news clippings, photos of post activities dated and identified as to publications they appeared in. Clippings must be arranged by month with emphasis on local news clippings.
- ★ Judging is based on post news content, Legion programs, chronological mounting, dates indicated, neatness and originality.
- ★ Scrapbooks will be displayed at Department Convention and returned.
- The commission reserves the right to disqualify any entry which in the opinion of the judges has been placed in an incorrect category.
- ★ DEADLINE FOR ENTRIES—JUNE 1, 2017. Entries must be for the period of JUNE 1, 2016 to JUNE 1, 2017.
- ★ Entries MUST be sent in and/or post marked NO LATER than JUNE 1, 2017.
- An entry form (below) MUST accompany each entry. Extra entry forms are available at Department Headquarters.
- ★ Securely fastened entry form to the first page of the scrapbook or newsletter or newsprint being submitted.
- * All entries MUST be signed by the Post Commander or Adjutant.
- * AWARDS—1st, 2nd, & 3rd place winners in each category will receive plaques at the Department Convention.
- ★ All other entries will receive Honorable Mention Citations.

HALL OF FAME AWARD

To be eligible for consideration for the Hall of Fame Award, entries must be entirely UNSELFISH service to comrades or to veterans in general. Commendable projects in which the Post reaps any benefit are NOT considered candidates for the Hall of Fame Award.

The Hall of Fame Award is for ONE outstanding activity by an individual Post or in conjunction with another Community Organization with the Post doing at least 2/3 of the project. This must not be confused with the Community Service Citation regularly issued by National Headquarters.



Each year, the Department of Illinois gives recognition to the Post within the Department that has rendered the most outstanding, unselfish and distinguished service.

This recognition is in the form of the Hall of Fame Award. Two bronze plaques are properly inscribed with the name of the winning Post, a brief description of the project, and the names of the Commander and Adjutant of the Post and of the Department and the Department Community Service Committee Chairman.

One plaque is placed permanently in the Hall of Fame in the Department Headquarters. Its counterpart is presented to the winning Post. Formal presentation will be made at the Department Convention.

Mail entries for the Hall of Fame Award in the form of a <u>scrapbook containing pictures</u>, <u>letters</u>, <u>financial expenses</u> (<u>photocopies of cancelled checks</u>), <u>newspaper clippings and any other supporting data</u> accompanied by a report containing a complete outline of the project - be at Department Headquarter **NO LATER THAN APRIL 1, 2017**. If a question arises, please contact the District or Division Chairman before submitting your entry to Department Headquarters for judging.
