Working and volunteering in communities, states and around the world, The American Legion has been dedicated to veterans, troops, national security, youth and patriotism since its founding nearly century ago.

More than 2.1 million wartime veterans of the U.S. Armed Forces are members of The American Legion. Joining them are nearly 1 million members of the American Legion Auxiliary, the nation's largest patriotic women's association, and more than 360,000 Sons of The American Legion, male descendants of U.S. wartime veterans. They work as one great American Legion Family of shared values, at more than 13,500 local posts worldwide, in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, the Caribbean, Europe, Latin America and Asia.

As a federally chartered organization, The American Legion upholds a sacred duty to provide free expert assistance for all who have served our country in the U.S. Armed Forces, as well as their families.

The American Legion is at work today in rural towns, urban neighborhoods, military installations and college campuses everywhere.

Each local post has its own unique identity, but they are all connected by common core values. A post in Puerto Vallarta, Mexico, for instance, provides care for children with cerebral palsy, Down Syndrome and other serious diseases. The American Legion in Wyoming coordinates the state high school rodeo championships.

An American Legion post in central California operates a multi-county ambu-

lance service. Another, in Alabama, offers after-school mentorship for students seeking direction. A post in Connecticut built, owns and operates a housing facility to help homeless veterans restart their lives.

Local examples of The American Legion's highest values are found worldwide, where differences are made daily for individuals, communities, states and the nation.

The Legion's fastest-growing membership segment is the post-9/11 generation. More than 100,000 strong and increasing, these young veterans help lead the organization in every way, alongside those who served in Desert Storm/Desert Shield, Grenada, Panama, Lebanon, Vietnam, Korea and World War II. No matter the war era, our members are indelibly connected through love of country, hope for the future, remembrance of the fallen and duty before self.


The Constitution. Law and order. Americanism. Memories of the Great Wars. Individual obligation. Peace, good will, prosperity, justice, freedom

That I have been a veterans' advocate for over 43 years and from my first year working for the Veterans Administration I heard rumors. My claimants would say they heard from a friend of a friend, scuttlebutt, barracks lawyers and the "know it all" vets. These rumors ranged from the unbelievable to some with a grain of truth. So to continue my tradition, here are some more rumors from the RUMOR MILL.

I have been rated 10% for tinnitus over twenty years ago and it's worse. I was told to file for an increase. SORRY, 10% is the maximum allowed for tinnitus. But do you have a Bilateral Hearing Loss which you never filed for? They are two distinct medical conditions.

My current Power of Attorney is the Disabled American Veterans (DAV) and they are working on my appeal. I want to file an entirely different claim and was told the American Legion could help. SORRY AGAIN, the VA only allows one veterans group at a time to represent you on ALL claims. However once the appeal is over we could assist you.

I have a service-connected skin condition and I use medication for that. It stains my clothes. I was told I could apply for an annual clothing allowance. TRUE, you should apply and if eligible the one-time yearly payment is currently over \$700.

I have been rated 100% for over 17 years. I was advised that if I was rated 100% over 15 years my surviving spouse would automatically qualify for benefits no matter what the cause of death. WRONG, it's only 10 years.

My buddy said I could use my VA home loan to buy a nice vacation home up north. I currently spend most of my time in Chicago but if I had a cabin in Wisconsin I would spend at least 2 months a year there. SORRY, for the home loan program you must live in the property over 50% of the time.

My husband married before and had a messy divorce. So he never put me on the title to his home but left it to me in his will. Now that he passed away I was told I can't get the property tax exemption for service-connected disabled vets that he qualified for while alive. CORRECT, the spouses name must be on the title at time of death for the exemption to pass to the surviving spouse. (The American Legion is trying the get that state law changed).

Well that's all for now. Keep your cards and letters coming, and of course your e-mails and telephone calls. Remember the only dumb question is the one that was never asked.

New Oak Ridge Cemetery monument will honor Gold Star Families

(OCT. 30, 2017) Ground was broken Monday on a monument in Oak Ridge Cemetery that will honor the families of service men and women killed in the line of duty. The Gold Star Families Memorial Monument will

be built on a knoll overlooking the veterans memorials at the Springfield cemetery. The monument will stand 6 feet tall at its peak, about 14 feet wide and include a silhouette of Hershel "Woody" Williams, a World War II veteran and Medal of Honor recipient who has spearheaded the erection of similar monuments in 26 states. The monument will read: "A tribute to Gold Star Families and relatives who sacrificed a loved one for our freedom."

Williams, 94, who attended Monday's ceremony at Oak Ridge, was born on a dairy farm in 1923 in Quiet Dell, West Virginia. He enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps and served in the Battle of Iwo Jima with the 21st Marines, 3rd Marine Division. Covered by four riflemen, Williams fought desperately for four hours under enemy small-arms fire and repeatedly returned to his own lines to prepare demolition charges and obtain serviced flamethrowers, his biography says. He was awarded the Medal of Honor for his "aggressive fighting spirit and valiant devotion to duty." On Monday, Williams said his goal with the monuments is to honor families of service men and women and perhaps aid in the healing process. "This is isn't about me. This is about them," Williams said referring to Gold Star families. A number of Gold Star

Jerry Young said the ceremony was emotional for him, and he was grateful for the effort to construct a monument for Gold Star families. His son, James "Chad" Young, a 25-year-old Glenwood High School graduate, was fatally

wounded when insurgents attacked his vehicle with an improvised explosive device in Kandahar province in southern Afghanistan in 2010.

"Their names must be seen, their names must be spoken and their names must be heard," Young said about soldiers killed in the line of duty.

The American Legion Reaffirms Position for "Strong America"



INDIANAPOLIS – In response to recent headlines about a divided country, The American Legion's board of directors unanimously passed a national resolution titled "Reaffirmation for a strong America."

In a meeting today in Indianapolis, the organization's National Executive Committee passed the statement which reaffirms the Legion's "unwavering support for the American way of life" under the U.S. Constitution, and "urges Americans and freedom-loving peoples everywhere to stand united in their respect" for each other, for military troops and law enforcement officials. It states that law enforcement officials "have the duty and responsibility of providing an orderly process to our way of life."

"It's time we spoke up and have our voice heard as we stand up for this country and for the principles upon which The American Legion was founded," said Americanism Commission Chairman Rich Anderson, adding that the resolution calls for unity and respect. "It cannot be disputed that we are a nation of diverse people having diverse perspectives, but I am confident that coming together as Legionnaires and especially as proud Americans alike, that

a 100 percent Americanism will persevere."

With a current membership of 2 million wartime veterans, The American Legion was founded in 1919 on the four pillars of a strong national security, veterans affairs, Americanism, and youth programs. Legionnaires work for the betterment of their communities through nearly 13,000 posts across the nation.

The American Legion Three Position Air Rifle Tournament

The American Legion Americanism Division annually presents its Junior Three Position Air Rifle

Tournament. This world class competition provides American Legion Affiliated youth competitors an opportunity to test their marksmanship ability in competition with other junior competitors throughout the nation.

The competition begins on **November 1, 2017** with a Postal Match; a match in which competitor's fire on their home ranges using targets that have been marked for identification. The fired targets are then returned to the American Legion for scoring and ranking for awards. Annually more than 1,300 individuals and 200 teams participate.

The tournament is divided into three rounds of exciting competition.

The First Round team tournament is a "paper" match and will be comprised of the top four athletes' individual tournament scores. A club with at least four individuals enters on team; at least eight individuals enters two teams; and so on.

The First Round and Second Round of the Individual Tournament are postal matches, whereas the Third Round is



the Individual National Championship and a shoulder-to-shoulder competition.

The American Legion Individual Three Position Air Rifle National Championships is held in July at the USA Shooting range facility located at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

The winners in both the Precision and Sporter category will each receive a **\$5,000.00** college scholarship provided in part by The American Legion and The Sons of the American Legion. The two winners are also honored as part of the Youth Champions Delegation during the American Legion National Convention.

Additionally, a **\$1,000.00** college scholarship will be awarded to the second place finishers in both the Sporter and Precision categories. This scholarship is being generously provided by The American Legion Auxiliary.

Flu Season is here! Veterans protect yourselves and get a NO COST flu shot!

The cold and flu season is upon us and the Department of Veterans Affairs has once again teamed up with Walgreens Pharmacies nationwide to allow all veterans who are currently enrolled in the VA healthcare system to be able walk into any of the over 8000 Walgreens nationally (and the Duane Reade pharmacies in the New York metropolitan area) to receive a vaccination *at no cost*. Vaccinations will be available through March 31, 2018.

Veterans wishing to receive the no cost vaccination simply need to present a Veterans Identification Card and a photo ID, at any participating Walgreens to receive the vaccination. The Group ID is: **VAFLU**

In addition, after the Walgreens pharmacist administers the vaccine Walgreens will transmit that information securely to VA where it becomes part of the patient's electronic medical record.



20 Youth nationwide receive Samsung American Legion Scholarship






Out of more than 5,300 applicants, the Samsung American Legion Scholarship for 2017 was awarded to 20 youth with a scholarship of up to \$10,000 for undergraduate study. And 79 department finalists each received \$1,250. The recipients earned the award based on several criteria, including participation in American Legion Boys State or Auxiliary Girl State and being a direct descendant of a wartime veteran eligible for American Legion membership. The recipients were announced during the Legion's annual Fall Meetings in Indianapolis on Oct. 11th.

Since Samsung bestowed an endowment to the Legion in 1995 for the establishment of a scholarship fund for family members of U.S. citizens who are war veterans, more than \$5.7 million has been awarded. The gesture was inspired by the support of the U.S. troops that came to the aid of South Korea while defending themselves against opposing Chinese and North Korean forces.

The Samsung American Legion Scholarship is available for high school juniors who participate in the current session of Boys State or Girls State and are direct descendants (or legally adopted children) of wartime veterans eligible for American Legion membership. The Samsung scholarship awards up to \$20,000 for undergraduate studies (e.g., room and board, tuition and books), and each applicant is selected according to his or her involvement in school and community activities, academic record and financial need.



TEMPORARY FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE RULES CHANGE

Veterans offered free dental care in statewide initiative

About 1,350 veterans statewide will get free dental care from 300 dentists next week through a first-time program that a Normal dentist has helped to organize.

Illinois Dentists Salute — sponsored by the Illinois State Dental Society in cooperation with the Illinois Department of Veterans' Affairs — is an effort by 300 dentists throughout Illinois to provide 1,350 veterans with one hour each of free dental care on Nov. 10 or 11.

Nov. 11 is Veterans Day. "Veterans have served our country and protected our freedoms," said Dr. Brad Barnes of Barnes Dental Associates in Normal. Barnes is co-chair of Illinois Dentists Salute with Dr. Loren Feldner, an Orland Park dentist.

But many veterans need better access to dental care, Barnes said. According to the state dental society, veterans don't qualify for government coverage of dental services unless they are disabled, were a prisoner of war or have servicerelated dental issues.

"We want to honor our veterans for their service to our country," Barnes said. "If they have a dental need, we want to meet it before it affects their health in an adverse way."

Over the years, some dentists such as Barnes provided free dental care for a limited number of veterans on or around Veterans Day. But frequently those efforts were low key and the number of veterans served was small. Barnes and his dental society colleagues decided to serve more veterans this year and developed a website (www.illinoisdentistssalute.org) for dentists to offer time slots that they would be available to serve veterans without charge on Nov. 10 or 11.

Three hundred dentists, including five in McLean County, volunteered 1,350 one-hour time slots. Then the website was opened to veterans. Veterans can go to the website and put in their ZIP code to find dentists who have open time slots to see veterans on Nov. 10 or 11. Veterans make their appointment on the website and then go to that dentist's office at that time. "We didn't want our veterans to stand in line waiting," Barnes said. As of Tuesday, 250 time slots remained open.

Veterans elect to have a free dental cleaning, extraction or filling. Barnes hopes that veterans would then identify that office as their dental home and return for future dental work.

"Dentists who are participating in the Illinois Dentists Salute initiative are putting their money where their mouths are by providing critically needed dental services to our Illinois heroes," said Erica Jeffries, director of the Illinois Department of Veterans' Affairs. "We are proud to partner with the Illinois State Dental Society for this special initiative and we thank them for providing this free dental service to our Illinois veterans." Jeffries encouraged veterans to register for the service. Barnes hopes the initiative becomes an annual event.
