Lincoln's promises, and ours

Fourscore and three years ago, The American Legion began a solemn tradition of honoring Abraham Lincoln. On Feb. 12, I will have the privilege of visiting Springfield, IL, and placing a wreath at the tomb of our 16th president during observances of his birthday.

The observances coincide with the 84th Annual National American Legion Pilgrimage to the Tomb of Abraham Lincoln, a tradition started in 1935 by Post 32 in Illinois' capital city.

Remarkably, the pilgrimage has had only four chairmen: World War I veteran Herbert Tragethon; World War II veteran Noel "Whitey" Moore; Vietnam War veteran

Michael Walton, who coordinated the event for 35 years, until 2012; and current chairman Tony Libri, a veteran of Bosnia, Panama and Afghanistan.

Libri believes the pilgrimage is the longest-running celebration of Lincoln's birthday in the nation. "We do this to bring attention to one of America's greatest presidents, and since it's his hometown, we want to honor his birth," he says.

Though Lincoln died a half-century before the founding of The American Legion, his second inaugural address anticipated the need for such an organization. "To care for him who shall have borne the battle and for his widow and his orphan" is not just a promise to those who fought the Civil War. It is a pillar of The American Legion.

We know that the men and women in today's armed forces fight for the country they love. Like the soldiers of Lincoln's day, they bravely go into harm's way knowing they might sacrifice life or limb in its defense.

It's why The American Legion provides scholarships to the children of the fallen and severely wounded. It's why Operation Comfort Warriors strives to meet the needs of wounded, injured or ill military personnel by providing items or recreational experiences not usually supplied by the government. It's why the Legion has more than 3,000 accredited service officers, dedicated to helping veterans receive the benefits they have earned, free of charge and regardless of Legion membership.

As inspirational as his promise to veterans and their families remains today, another pledge Lincoln made at Gettysburg resonates, too: that "government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth." The American Legion Family understands all too well the sacrifices necessary for the survival of representative democracy.



Did You Know?

That the American Legion VA&R Chicago office helps veterans and their dependents through many different means. We have walk-in hours, interviews by appointment; receive daily e-mails, telephone calls and regular mail. We also attend outreach events. Some of our contacts are routine e.g. follow up on claims, submitting new evidence or updating addresses or banking information. Other contacts involve much more and often times end up with our office filing a new or reopened claim. While we try our best to help all we serve we realize that we can't assist everyone. In those cases at least we will steer them in the right direction. Looking back at 2017 I want to highlight some of the more interesting and successful claims or situations we handled.

- 1. A veteran asked us to help him with a claim that he had been fighting for ten years. He had filed for PTSD (Post Traumatic Stress Disorder) but when the Veterans Administration ordered an exam he was in jail and couldn't make it. That claim was denied for failure to report for the exam. Being recently released from jail he was homeless and no permanent address. He got him registered in the Veterans Health Administration system and he started treatment for his mental health condition. We also located a relative who agreed to accept his mail and alert him when any VA letters arrived. We had the exam for the claim reschedule, he reported and now is receiving 70% service-connected disabled compensation. We also got him over one year of retroactive payments. He is no longer homeless and has returned to school under the Vocational Rehabilitation program for disabled vets.
- 2. We were asked to participate in an open house for veterans sponsored by a local hospital. We were one group of about twenty that were there and we manned a table with American Legion pamphlets. We also had one of our Service Officers present to answer questions and possibly take claims. A widow who worked at that hospital was just passing and saw our table. A brief conversation occurred and it turns out her husband served in Viet Nam, was exposed to Agent Orange and died eleven months ago from lung cancer. We immediately started a claim for Survivors benefits and she was later granted over \$1,200 a month. She is now also eligible for VA sponsored health care under CHAMPVA. And since the claim was filed within one year of his death she received a nice retroactive check.
- 3. A female veteran had multiple service-connected disabled conditions but when the VA added them up using their combined rating table she ended up at 64% disabled. Rounded down to 60% she got that level of pay. We went through her file and noticed that she had extensive surgery which left several scars. Asked if these were tender or icky to the touch she said "oh yeah". If my kids accidentally touch one of them she feels pain. We put in for a tender scar, she got 10% for that and again using the VA's combined rating table she now added up to 66% and that was rounded up to the 70% pay level. Not only does she get more money but now her property taxes in Illinois will be waived entirely.
- 4. A daughter wrote our office. She very much wanted to join the American Legion auxiliary but was unable to locate her deceased father's DD 214. She was borne out of wedlock during the Korean War and didn't even know who her natural father was until her mother died and she was going through some family papers. All she had was a name, no date of birth or date of death. Luckily it was an unusual last name. We located four vets with that name but only one of those served during the Korean War. We located his records in a National Archives, had them transferred to Chicago and got the necessary discharge paper. The daughter is now a member of our Auxiliary. She was also very happy to learn that her father received a Bronze Star and Purple Heart awards for his service.

Finally a veteran had his case on appeal for over three years. He was being denied benefits for a back injury which occurred while in the Michigan National Guard during summer camp. Although his leg injury happened during that time and he was granted benefits for the leg, he couldn't locate proof of the back injury. We guided him to local papers in the area of his old National Guard unit. He ran several classified ads seeking any veteran who was in his unit during that summer camp. Several responded who remembered both him and his complaints of his back pain. Affidavits were obtained, submitted to the Board of Veterans Appeals and he won!

People are always asking me why I am still working part-time as an American Legion Service Officer. Didn't I have enough of the job with 33 years at the Veterans Administration? I simple reply that as long as I can continue to help my fellow veterans and have successful outcomes like the ones above I will continue to work and long as I can.

Our Service Officers will be heading off to D.C. soon for our semi-annual Service Officer Training School. Hope to learn some new things to pass on to you all. And with a New Year starting we all are getting a little older so just remember

Old age is not so bad when you consider the alternatives.

Remember the heroic acts of four Army chaplains on Feb. 4



Feb. 3 will mark the 75th anniversary of the sinking of the United States Army Transport Dorchester and the selfless acts of four Army chaplains who were aboard. American Legion posts nationwide are encouraged to commemorate the anniversary each February and honor Four Chaplains Day.

The Dorchester tragically sunk on Feb. 3, 1943, while crossing the North Atlantic, transporting troops to an American base in Greenland. A German U-boat fired a torpedo that struck the Dorchester, killing 672 of the 902 officers and enlisted men, merchant seamen and civilian workers aboard.

Many of those survivors owe their lives to the courage and leadership exhibited by four chaplains of different faiths, who, in sacrificing their lives, created a unique legacy of brotherhood.

As soldiers rushed to lifeboats, Reverend George Fox (Methodist), Jewish Rabbi Alexander Goode, Reverend Clark Poling (Dutch Reformed) and Father John Washington (Roman Catholic) comforted the wounded and directed others to safety. One survivor watched the chaplains distribute life jackets, and when they ran out, they removed theirs and gave them to four young men.

As the Dorchester sank, the chaplains were seen linked arm in arm, praying.

Fox, Goode, Poling and Washington were posthumously awarded the Distinguished Service Cross and the Purple Heart. And in 1948, Congress declared Feb. 3 to be Four Chaplains Day.

American Legion posts nationwide remember Four Chaplains Day with memorial services that pay tribute to the courageous chaplains and the brave young men who lost their lives on that fateful night. This year, Four Chaplains Sunday is Feb. 4.

Posts interested in conducting a Four Chaplains memorial service can learn how to through the Legion's Chaplain's Manual.

Two former American Legion Baseball players, Chipper Jones and Jim Thome, were announced as members of the much-anticipated 2018 National Baseball Hall of Fame class.

Jeff Idelson, president of the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum in Cooperstown, N.Y., announced the results on MLB Network on Wednesday night. Both Thome and Jones were first-ballot Hall of Famers.

Jones and Thome will be the 75th and 76th Legion alums in the Hall of Fame, with 13 former Legion players inducted in the last five years. They will be enshrined on July 29 and will be joined by fellow <u>Legion alums Jack Morris and Alan Trammell</u>, both of whom were elected to this class through the Modern Era Committee in December.

Jones played American Legion Baseball for Post 6 in Deland, Fla., from 1986-1989 with his stellar play earning him the top pick in the 1990 MLB draft.

Jones's 19-year career with the Atlanta Braves featured eight All-Star Game appearances, a National League Most Valuable Player award in 1999 and a World Series title in 1995.

The third baseman was named the 2000 American Legion Baseball Graduate of the Year.

Thome played Legion Baseball for Bartonville Limestone Post 979 in Illinois and became a fan favorite over his lengthy professional career. He played for six different teams, including the Cleveland Indians, Chicago White Sox and Philadelphia Phillies.

He was a five-time All-Star and earned the Roberto Clemente Award, given to the player "best exemplifies the game of baseball, sportsmanship, community involvement and the individual's contribution to his team."


Joining Jones, Thome, Morris and Trammell in this class are Vladimir Guerrero and Trevor Hoffman.



'You have to ask people seven to 12 times to join'

Though not affiliated, the Association of the United States Army (AUSA) relied on the Army for membership recruitment. However, a few years ago the Army stopped recruiting for AUSA due to various reasons and with no recruitment plan in

place, AUSA began to see a rapid decline in membership.

In 2017, with 62,000 members, AUSA put forth a challenge to its 121 chapters nationwide to reach 100,000 members by yearend. Today, AUSA stands at 116,000 members.

AUSA is a nonprofit military service organization that supports America's Army (active, National Guard, reserve, civilians and family members) through training, scholarships, being a voice and more. Retired Lt. Gen. Patricia E. McQuistion, vice president of membership and meetings for AUSA and a member of American Legion Post 251 in Georgia, spoke to members of the Legion's Membership & Post Activities Committee on Jan. 12 about ways the association exceeded its membership goal.

"We understand service to nation. We understand volunteerism. We understand that our association has a lot in common with The American Legion," McQuistion said. "And we know through research that sometimes you have to ask people seven to 12 times to join. That's one of the hardest things our volunteer leaders do ... asking somebody to join."

Membership recruitment and retention is the fifth tactic on the Legion's strategic membership plan. With 16 million veterans eligible for Legion membership, McQuistion said if someone says no to joining the first time you ask, it's not a rejection of you or The American Legion. "So don't be afraid to go after them seven to 12 times," she said.

Besides just asking potential members to join AUSA, other recruitment efforts that the association adopted included:

- Started a "Get One More" campaign and made it easy for new members to join online (https://www.ausa.org/). With this they used every event they were at as a membership recruitment opportunity. "I take it as a personal mission everywhere I go to get at least one person to sign up," McQuistion said.
- Revamped membership fees. McQuistion said about 32 percent of the new recruits were of the younger generation

of veterans and servicemembers. So AUSA created a special discount of a \$10 membership fee for an Army E4 rank, Army civilians and ROTC cadets. They too created a two-year membership fee of \$40 or five-year for \$75 as a way to make retention easier.

• Connected with like-minded organizations. AUSA currently has relationship with six other associations, such as the Warrant Officers Association, as a way to not only attract new members but to gain a better understanding of the needs and issues of those servicemembers and to be a voice for them as well.

Past National Commander Dave Rehbein reflected on how the Legion can team up with like-minded organizations, such as Team Red, White and Blue, Team Rubicon, Summit for Soldiers or Student Veterans of America. "This new generation of veterans want to do things. They don't want to sit in a meeting and hear about what's being done. They want to be part of what's being done," Rehbein said. "So if we can use some of these organizations to bring in new members, I think we gain more than just new members – we gain active members."

• Created a membership benefits pamphlet. The pamphlet makes it easy for volunteers to answer the question, "Why should I join AUSA?" It lists membership benefits, such as a subscription to ARMY Magazine that AUSA publishes, and features an infographic on the three reasons to join: give, get, save. "Give your time, talent and expertise; get representation with Congress and on Capitol Hill, access to professional development and education offerings, and scholarship opportunities; and save on exclusive AUSA benefits."

McQuistion also shared that more than 85 percent of those who serve today entered the service after 9/11. This generation of veterans, she said, want to make a positive difference in their communities. "Young veterans today have families and jobs, but they are looking for ways to engage on their own terms. So when you ask a veteran or service-member to join, get them involved at some level, make them feel a part of the organization," McQuistion said.

"We have to be voices for our service people and their families so that more American's understand not just the sacrifices but just the commitment of these people to serve our nation."

More than 133,000 vets may qualify for this tax refund windfall

More than 133,000 veterans may qualify for a refund of federal taxes they paid on disability severance pay dating back to 1991 — taxes that shouldn't have been collected in the first place.

Within the next month, Defense Department officials will send notification letters to veterans that they may be eligible for the refund, said Army Lt. Col. David Dulaney, executive director of the Armed Forces Tax Council.

Eligible veterans will have a year after they receive the notice to file a claim for the refund.

These refunds, which are the result of a law passed in 2016, apply to veterans who received this pay dating back to Jan. 17, 1991, with taxes withheld, and who also qualified for disability from the Veterans Affairs Department.

The 2016 Combat Injured Veterans Tax Fairness Act went into effect in 2017. The law requires DoD to identify the veterans whose benefits were previously improperly taxed; and the notification letter will include information about the amount of disability severance payments that were improperly taxed, and instructions for filing an amended tax return to receive the refund.

Of the 300,000 veterans who received the disability severance payment, DoD has identified 133,000 who may qualify for refunds, Dulaney said.

College becomes attainable with Legion Legacy Scholarship

Jacob Mussi knew college was in his future. What he didn't know was how to pay for it.

While searching for opportunities to make college attainable, Mussi came across The American Legion's Legacy Scholarship. Mussi's father, a disabled post-9/11 veteran, made him eligible to apply.

Last May, Mussi received an email that announced he was a 2017 American Legion Legacy Scholarship recipient. Upon seeing the email, Mussi and his father "went nuts. It blew my mind," Mussi said. "I went from thinking I was going to have \$200,000 in student loans to thinking that...this is going to work out. I can invest in my future.

"My father (Charles) can't afford to fund my college so he was overwhelmed with joy. A potential burden has been swept out of the way."

The scholarship is allowing Mussi, a physics student at Boston University, to focus on his academics rather than "focusing on financing them," he said. "Having that steady stream of support is fundamental to making the college experience work. Because of help from The American Legion Legacy Scholarship and other scholarships, I have a lot of freedom that people in my age group don't typically have because of restraint of finances."

The Legacy Scholarship is available for children of veterans who died on active duty since Sept. 11, 2001, or have a combined VA disability rating of 50 percent or higher. Recipients of the renewable needs based scholarship can receive up to \$20,000 each year. The application deadline for the 2018-2019 school year is April 9.


