That each year our Legion Service Officers from all of our State Departments meet in Indianapolis, Indiana for training? For three days they are furnished with a wealth of information from the law firm of Bergmann & Moore and the Department of Veterans Affairs. This training is sponsored by the American Legion VA&R Washington office. Here are some of the highlights:

- Veterans Administration debt letters should not be ignored. If a veteran doesn't pay the debt, request a waiver or agree to a payment plan that debt will be turned over to a collection agency. The fees associated with that are 28%! And it will cause a drop in your credit score of up to 150 points. DON'T IGNORE THOSE LETTERS, ACT IMMEDIATELY.
- Regarding debts, the Veterans Administration can also take up to 15% of a veteran's Social Security check.
- The VA is now making 1.4 million claim decisions a year and the average processing time is 99 days.
- Pain alone, if there is no known cause of it, can be considered a disability if it causes some functional impairment and there was some incident in service.
- If a vet uses the CHOICE program those records are NOT automatically sent to their VA hospital or clinic. So if a vet files a request for an increase they should alert the VA that they were treated under CHOICE.
- There are 460,000 appeals currently pending and if a vet requests a personal or video hearing that adds 2 years to the process. The new RAMP program should help reduce this immensely but as of now some appeals are taking 7 years!
- If a vet filed a claim in the 70's and the VA got it but never acted on it the vet could get back pay all the way to the original date they filed.
- Of the 3.5 million exams ordered for VA claims, 1.7 million were contracted out to private sources.
- As of February of 2019 there will be no more travel board appeal hearings, only videos.
- Back conditions can lead to bowel and bladder problems which can be considered secondary service-connection.
- Soldiers who were involved in production of uranium at Paducah, KY Oak Ridge, TN and Portsmouth, OH might now get service-connected compensation for some cancers.
- Of those veterans who file claims for a mental condition 60% have PTSD (Post Traumatic Stress Disorder) and 12% have major depression.
- If a vet uses alcohol to numb the effects of their PTSD (Post Traumatic Stress Disorder) they might now be able to get 2nd service-connection for the alcohol abuse.
- The top three conditions that are granted for service-connection are Bilateral Hearing Loss, Tinnitus and a mental condition.
- The VA's Debt Management Center collected 1.6 Billion dollars in overpayment last year. Their telephone system is now open M_F from 6:30 am to 6:00 pm CST.

That's all for now, hope to be able to report next month on our state convention resolutions that were sent to the national convention.

In the McLean County area, there are organizations that contact veterans with promises of "free" money from the VA. These organizations claim they will file the necessary applications to acquire a VA pension and/or aid and attendance benefits at no charge.

Illinois Attorney General Lisa Madigan recently filed suit against the Association for Wartime Veterans and Atlantis Marketing Solutions for steering veterans and their families into costly insurance products or expensive "irrevocable trusts" that, in effect, hide the true assets of the veteran so the veteran will appear to be low-income and thus qualify for the pension benefit. Check out claims with the Illinois Department of Veterans Affairs Office or the Illinois Attorney General's Office.

Land of Lincoln Honor Flight

The mission of Land of Lincoln Honor Flight is to show gratitude for our World War II, Korean era and Vietnam era Veterans by taking them--free of charge--to Washington DC to visit the memorials dedicated to their service.

We offer one-day flights departing from Abraham Lincoln Capitol Airport (Springfield) to Reagan National Airport in Washington DC. Venues visited include the World War II Memorial, the Korean War Memorial, the Vietnam Wall, the Lincoln Memorial, the US Marine Corps Memorial (Iwo Jima), the US Air Force Memorial, the Smithsonian Air and Space Museum in Virginia and Arlington National Cemetery for the changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknowns.

Land of Lincoln Honor Flight serves a territory of approximately 25,000 square miles. Included in this area are the key central and southern Illinois cities of Bloomington-Normal, Urbana-Champaign, Decatur, Alton, Carlinville, Clinton, Danville, Effingham, Havana, Jerseyville, Lincoln, Litchfield, Mattoon, Rantoul and Springfield as well as the surrounding areas.

Land of Lincoln Honor Flight was established in 2009 as part of the National Honor Flight Network. As of June 2018, Land of Lincoln Honor Flight has served 3,856 Veterans on 50 flights.

This day of honor and gratitude is completely free for our Veterans. They have paid enough with their service; it is our turn to pay them back. Funding for these flights comes from the generous donations of individuals, merchandise sales and proceeds from fund-raisers held by local patriotic organizations and citizens in the community who want to demonstrate their gratitude for the sacrifices made by these Veterans who secured our freedom.

Land of Lincoln Honor Flight is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization and receives no federal, state or local government funds. The organization is run by an all-volunteer team that is committed to serving Veterans. A seven-member volunteer Board of Directors provides direction. There is no paid staff, office/utilities costs, etc, which keeps our administrative costs to under 1%, so virtually every dollar raised supports flight costs.

Veterans are offered flights in priority based upon their service. World War II Veterans are given top priority followed by Korean era Vets, then Vietnam Veterans. At present, there is virtually no waiting list for World War II or Korean era Veterans; new applicants will be offered the next available flight. The current wait time for Vietnam Veterans is a minimum of 2 years. Priority is also given to a Veteran who has a terminal illness or medical condition that would impeded his/her ability to participate in and enjoy the experience.

Help us carry out our mission of giving our Veterans "one more tour with honor" by recruiting World War II, Korean era, and Vietnam era Veterans who have not yet participated on an Honor Flight. Applications can be downloaded from landoflincolnhonorfight.org. Volunteers to serve as Guardians on a future flight are always needed. Guardians ensure our Veterans are comfortable and safely enjoy the day. In addition, Guardians have the honor of spending the day with true American heroes. Help us raise funds for future flights by sponsoring a fund-raiser or collecting donations. Representatives are available to share our mission, passion, and history with your social group, civic organization, business, school, etc. Finally, the public is invited to our Welcome Home events (August 21, September 25 and October 30) to give these Veterans the welcome home they never got but so richly deserve.

The 7 Ways You Can Mentor a fellow Veteran

As you leave the military, you're likely being encouraged to find a mentor--someone who can guide you, advise you, and provide information and introductions for you as you enter the civilian workforce. Since 80 percent of new jobs come through a personal connection, networking and mentoring are critical for today's job seeker.


Have you considered, however, how you could help a servicemember separating or retiring by mentoring them? As someone who is on the path to a successful transition, you have skills, insights, information and other resources to share.

Here are 7 ways you can mentor a veteran (as a veteran):

- 1. Tell them what worked/didn't work for you.** You've made the transition and (hopefully) are doing well. What did you do that you're glad you did. What do you regret? What was the best or worst advice you received? Share this insight with a veteran embarking on their transition.
- 2. Help expand their network.** Coming out of the military, it's likely that the veteran knows other service-members, veterans and military workers. If you've started to form your own network of professional contacts, consider making some introductions for the veteran to people who would be good influencers. These people can help that veteran jump-start the development of their own personal network on contacts..
- 3. Check in with them often.** Even if you don't have anything specific to review or discuss, drop your veteran mentee a quick email or phone call to check in. See if they are doing ok: Are they getting out? Have they had any meetings? Is there anything you can do to help? You know, as a veteran, that asking for help is challenging. Provide the opening by initiating the call.

- 4. Meet them for coffee, lunch or breakfast.** If it's at all possible, try to meet with your mentee in person. Even a quick coffee meeting in the middle of the day can help someone who is struggling to stay connected to their community. For many veterans, the transition can feel isolating. Physically check in with them if you can.
- 5. Invite them to events and gatherings and go with them.** You likely resisted the idea of networking with strangers when you first transitioned out of the military. Invite your mentee to go with you to a job fair, networking event, or social gathering. Having someone with them eases the tension and makes the situation more tolerable.
- 6. Cheer them up.** If you come across a funny joke email (one that isn't potentially offensive,) send it to your mentee. Your email might arrive at just the moment they were feeling down or lost.
- 7. Keep their perspective in check.** Think back to those first days, weeks and months of your own transition: The fear, anxiety, hope, and excitement you felt as you left the comforts and familiarity of the military to enter the next chapter of your life. Every feeling you had is likely going through the mind of the veteran you are mentoring. Use that information to help them keep perspective of the ups and downs of the transition.

Sharing what you know with someone coming up behind you is an inherent aspect of military service, and one you can leverage in the civilian sector. Finding a servicemember or veteran who seeks guidance, support and information, and mentoring them to success, is a rewarding way to serve those who've served.

Team Illinois - 2018 Legacy Riders



After more than 1,000 miles traversed from Hutchinson, Kan., to Anoka, Minn., The American Legion Riders had helped raise more than \$600,000 for The American Legion Legacy Scholarship Fund. But they weren't close to being done.

Five days after the 13th annual American Legion Legacy Run ended, Legion Riders gathered on the 100th annual American Legion National Convention stage to present donations to the Legacy Fund. By the time the donations were finished, a record \$1,256,930 had been raised – the fifth-straight year the ride has raised more than \$1 million.

"It is difficult for those of you who are not involved with The American Legion Riders to understand the passion that the men and women in The American Legion Family have for our fellow veterans, their families, the community and to the memory of our fallen comrades," said Legionnaire Bob Sussan, chairman of the National American Legion Riders Advisory Committee and the chief road captain for the Legacy Run.

The American Legion Department of Minnesota led the way, donating \$251,000 on the national convention floor -- \$51,000 more than the department delivered a year ago. Other top department donations on Tuesday were the departments of Missouri (\$93,324), South Carolina (\$65,204), Florida (\$57,005), Wisconsin (\$45,439), and Kansas (\$27,717). And Stevens-Christian Post 557 in Wintersville, Ohio, contributed \$15,000.

The five-day Legacy Run left Kansas and traveled through Missouri, Iowa and Wisconsin before finishing outside of Minneapolis. More than 200 motorcycles completed the ride.

The Legacy Fund provides college money for the children of U.S. military personnel killed on active duty on or after Sept. 11, 2001, as well as children of post-9/11 veterans with a combined VA disability rating of 50 percent or higher.
