y fellow Legionnaires, we are well into our 2019-2020 American Legion Year and seeing great opportunities to get our Membership moving forward. As you all know by now, the Legion Act has opened a huge opportunity for everyone to step up and sign up new Veterans for the American Legion that were not eligible prior to this because of how Congress set up the eligibility dates. Now when you visit with these eligible Veterans and they ask, "Well, why should I join now, you never wanted me in the past" you can clear the air. Plus, they will be eligible for many of our American Legion benefits. It is up to each and EVERYONE of us to reach out and encourage them to join our Great Organization, The American Legion. To my knowledge there is no master list of these eligible Veterans, so it comes down to each current Legionnaire to search out these men and women who have served their country and now can support their fellow Veterans even more. As a member they would also eligible for the many benefits the Legion offers.

Also, as our Membership Goal for this year is 77,082, we must encourage our Posts to get their renewals in prior to December 31st for their members to be eligible for the Legion benefits. Yes, our Membership Year is from July 1st thru June 30th, but all who are current by the end of the calendar year are eligible for additional benefits.

Dear American Legion Family and Friends,

While the LEGION Act ushered in an opportunity to grow our membership, it wasn't the only recent significant change to eligibility in The American Legion Family.



During our 101st National Convention, <u>a change to The American Legion's National Constitution and Bylaws</u> was approved to welcome "spouses" rather than just "wives" as members of an American Legion Auxiliary unit. The LEGION Act alone creates an opportunity to engage and <u>add up to 4.2 million new members</u> who were not eligible under the previous standards set by Congress. And, of course, the LEGION Act also means that sons and grandsons of these new eligible veterans are now able to become members of Sons of The American Legion.

Thanks to these changes, The American Legion Family should be able to grow our total membership well beyond the current number of roughly 3 million members.

Just think what more than 3 million American Legion Family members will be able to do for their communities across the nation.

More of our nation's veterans will receive the assistance they need from The American Legion.

More children will learn about patriotism, appreciate flag etiquette and receive mentorship.

More wounded servicemembers will receive care, support and essential equipment to boost their recoveries.

More veteran-friendly legislation will pass through the bodies of Congress and Statehouses across our great nation.

The list goes on and on, of course. But what is vital to note is we have an unprecedented opportunity in front of us. It is not an understatement to say that every single living U.S. veteran with an honorable discharge is eligible for membership in The American Legion. And the spouses of these veterans are also entitled to join The American Legion Auxiliary.

Through the LEGION Act and bylaw changes, The American Legion is truly building a foundation for the future.

Commander Oxford's new recruiting goal:

HOW DO WE GET THERE?

The excitement and rejuvenation we feel coming out of the 101st American Legion National Convention is evident. There were some notable achievements that set conditions for a truly re- markable 2020 membership year.

If all things had remained consistent coming into convention, 100,000 new members would have been seen as a difficult road ahead. However, looking at initiatives that surfaced during 2019 have Legionnaires from around the globe convinced that we will surpass the national commander's goal.

First, is the Buddy Check. The Buddy Check is not a membership drive, but rather an opportunity to get back to taking care of our fellow veterans. Veterans get the help they need and communities see an active post taking care of their own. The Buddy Check helped us get back to our roots and vindicate our purpose to consecrate and sanctify our comradeship by our devotion to mutual helpfulness.

Second, is the monumental legislative achievement of the passing of the LEGION Act. The LEGION Act extends the current recognized war era back to Dec. 7, 1941, to honor military members who served their country with honor but whose service fell in gaps between war eras. This opens up membership eligibility and pays respect to 1,600 U.S. servicemembers who were killed or wounded during previously undeclared periods of war.

The following is a four-step recruiting process to help The American Legion and our commander achieve our goal.

1. Know the history of the organization. All of the armed forces were born from necessity, but made storied by rich history. The history of each military service branch formed the foundation of its culture, and the culture is one of the many facets that appealed to us. Upon joining, we knew we had an obligation to continue the proud legacy of those that wore the cloth of our nation before us—and so we did just that! It seems obvious, then, that knowing the rich history of The American Legion is the minimum requirement for recruiting new members. This is why, at a minimum, every Legionnaire should take the Basic Training course. In order to have a vision for the future, we must know our past and remain committed to the strategic purpose of the organization.

- 2. Sell the history, but paint a vivid picture of the future. While it is important to know our rich history, it is even more important to understand our significance to the future of this great organization. A quick glimpse of the road behind us inspires pride and confidence in what we have done, but the road ahead reminds of the challenges and obstacles still ahead. In the process of looking for new members, identify veterans with the same interests and passion that will move us forward. Then paint a vision of what the grand future of The American Legion could be with their talents in our member ranks. If a prospective member can visualize themselves working with The American Legion, giving back and finding purpose in life, they will join.
- 3. Satisfy the real needs of prospective members. Selling an organization is complex. To gain appeal, The America Legion needs to satisfy the needs of the prospective members who believe the organization can truly deliver on its many promises to veterans and their communities. That may be a need for camaraderie, a need to belong, a need to fulfill purpose, a need to help fellow veterans, a need to share burdens and demons, a need to advance community relations, or countless other subjective needs. Of course, as is true with everything in life, there is no achieved perfection or ability to satisfy everyone's wants and needs. However, the more accommodating we can be to the real needs of the member, the more confident that we can be that we are selling truth!
- 4. Under promise and over deliver. The simple reality is this: the biggest threat to recruiting is selling a lie. If you promise rainbows and butterflies and deliver dungeons and dragons, there is your first leadership failure — a broken promise. Selling the rich history of the collective body [and what it could be with their membership] can help to inspire them not only to join, but to be the necessary agents of change to advance us into our next century. After all, we all wanted to have a positive impact on our service and did — and so holds true for the future of The American Legion if we cultivate the young veteran talent. The foundation for being a Legionnaire is serving others before self, but human nature is to make the best "mutually beneficial" decision. Show the potential member how their participation in our organization can improve us, while also helping them with their own personal and professional growth.

GOVERNMENT FORMS

Often times we get calls from clients asking for a particular form. We can certainly send it by "snail mail" and they will get it in 3-4 days or they can go to the above site, download the form and they are good to go. This site not only has all VA forms but also includes Department of Defense (DOD), Standard Forms (SF) and General Service Administration (GSA) forms. All are just a click away.

TELEPHONE BOOKS

www.whitepages.com

We use this one a lot. It has a database drawn from all the telephone directories published in the United States. You can search for a person using their name only, or add a state search or localize it to a particular town. Especially useful in trying to track down old military buddies to get affidavits for VA claims. This site also includes reverse look up.

NATIONAL GRAVESITE LOCATOR

Your family wants to visit the gravesite of your favorite uncle or aunt who served during the Korean Conflict. This site can often times help locate where they are buried and will include the veteran's branch of service, date of birth and date of death.

PERSONAL VA ACCOUNTS (BENEFITS) www.ebenefits.va.gov

This site lets you set up your own account so you can track your claim or appeal anytime. Need a certificate of eligibility for a VA

loan, change your direct deposit info, a civil service preference letter or proof of service? This is the place to go.

PERSONAL VA ACCOUNTS (HOSPITAL)

This site is used to check your upcoming hospital appointments, schedule one, contact your VA provider and review your medical tests.

When Post members have a VA benefit question and prefer to e-mail us rather than call. Our questions run the gamut from how to obtain a replacement military discharge to how to file a claim for service-connected disabled compensation or Non-Service Connected pension. We monitor this site daily and one can expect a return reply from one of our Service Officers within 1-2 days.

With your membership comes a free \$1,000 accidental death insurance policy. It's \$5,000 if traveling on official American Legion business. Be sure yours is current. If your dues lapsed even for a few weeks it was inactivated and you have to activate it again.

Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act

The Blue Water Navy (BWN) Vietnam Veterans Act of 2019 (PL 116-23), signed into law on June 25, 2019.

Veterans who served on vessels operating not more than 12 nautical miles seaward from the demarcation line of the waters of Vietnam and Cambodia, between **January 9, 1962, and May 7, 1975** may file a claim for presumptive conditions.

The bill also covers veterans who served in the Korean Demilitarized Zone between Sept. 1, 1967, and Aug. 31, 1971, as well as children born to veterans who served in Thailand between January 1962 and May 1975 who have spina bifida.

The law takes effect January 1, 2020. Final decisions will not be made until after January 1, 2020.

Any previously denied Veterans will need to reapply for compensation and may be eligible for a retroactive effective date.

Widows of Veterans that passed of Agent Orange presumptives are also encouraged to file a claim for benefits.


The following are Agent Orange presumptives:

- ♦ AL Amyloidosis
- ♦ Chronic B-cell Leukemia's
- ♦ Diabetes Mellitus Type 2
- ♦ Hodgkin's Disease
- Ischemic Heart Disease
- Multiple Myeloma
- ♦ Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma
- ♦ Parkinson's Disease
- ♦ Prostate Cancer
- Respiratory Cancers (includes lung cancer)
- **♦** Soft Tissue Sarcomas
- Porphyria Cutanea Tarda (must have appeared within one year of exposure to herbicides)
- Chloracne (or similar acneform disease) (must have appeared within one year of exposure to herbicides)

Legion updates Auxiliary eligibility criteria from 'wives' to 'spouses'

As American Legion national commander during 2017-2018, Denise Rohan traveled all over the nation visiting American Legion posts. And at many of her stops she heard from female Legionnaires married to non-veterans that there was no place for their spouses in the American Legion Family.

That's no longer the case. During the recent American Legion's 101st National



In August, Denise – a member of American Legion Post 385 and Auxiliary Unit 385 in Verona, Wis. - watched as her fellow U.S. Army veteran husband Mike became a member of the American Legion Auxiliary.

Convention, delegates approved changes to the Constitution and Bylaws to replace the word "wife" with "spouse," related to the membership criteria for the American Legion Auxiliary .

The American Legion, which was chartered by Congress, created the ALA. For that reason, the ALA operates as a separate corporation and does not need congressional approval for an eligibility change. The American Legion's bylaws have always set the eligibility requirements of the ALA.

"We are happy to welcome eligible male spouses of veterans and servicemembers to the American Legion Family," ALA National President Nicole Clapp said. "This is consistent with our longstanding legacy of embracing military families and supporting them any way we can."

The ALA expects to begin taking applications for new potential members Sept. 1.

The change to Article XIII now reads as such:

The American Legion recognizes an auxiliary organization, known as The American Legion Auxiliary.

Membership in The American Legion Auxiliary shall be limited to the:

- 1) grandmothers, mothers, sisters, spouses, and direct and adopted female descendants of members of The American Legion; and
- 2) grandmothers, mothers, sisters, spouses, and direct and adopted female descendants of all men and women who served in either of the following periods: April 6, 1917, to November 11, 1918, and any time after December 7, 1941, who, being a citizen of the United States at the time of their entry therein served on active duty in the Armed Forces of any of the governments associated with the United States during either eligibility periods and died in the line of duty or after honorable discharge;
- 3) grandmothers, mothers, sisters, spouses, and direct and adopted female descendants of all men and women who were in the Armed Forces of the United States during either of the following periods: April 6, 1917, to November 11, 1918; and any time after December 7, 1941 who served on active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States during either eligibility periods and died in the line of duty or after honorable discharge; and
- 4) to those women who of their own right are eligible for membership in The American Legion.

COMMANDER WEBER'S SPECIAL PROJECT

EF grants provide immediate financial assistance for American Legion and Sons of The American Legion members who have been affected by the natural disaster. Legion posts also qualify.

The NEF provides up to \$3,000 for Legion and SAL members with an active membership who have been displaced due to damages to their primary residence, and up to \$10,000 for posts that have been damaged by a natural disaster and whose programs and activities within the community are impacted.

"In these tough times, The American Legion's National Emergency Fund provides much-needed financial support to help American Legion Family members recover from tragedy.

When the federal government shut down last winter, servicemembers in the U.S. Army, Navy, Air Force and Marines continued to receive their paychecks. But on Jan. 15, 2019 members of the U.S. Coast Guard - which falls under the Department of Homeland Security - did not get paid.

That's when The American Legion stepped in, delivering \$1,000,500 in Temporary Financial Assistance grants, assisting 3,120 children of 1,173 active-duty Coast Guardsmen service- members who were financially affected by the shutdown. That total was a record amount for a single-month of TFA grant distribution.

Illinois Can Help! Department of Illinois Commander Roy Weber is asking for your assistance by donating, be it large or small, to the replenishment of the National Emergency Funds thus ensuring these funds are available for the next persons time of need.

The Gold Star Mission, a non-profit organization works to create scholarships in honor of fallen heroes as they raise funds for veterans across the state. "I'd really like to know 10 years from now, that some young lady or some young man is sitting around the kitchen table telling their family they were able to get a scholarship in college," said President & Founder of Gold Star Mission, David Helfrich.

The scholarships are not just for the families of the fallen vets, but for everyone who is willing to apply.

At the stop in Bloomington, Gold Star Mom, Vonda Rodgers said "Our sons went international, and they fought for global freedoms." "Locally we can fight for financial freedoms by contributing dollars. By offering the scholarships, we not only keep our fallen heroes alive, we also promote financial freedom and that's what it is all about."

So far, the Gold Star Mission has given away \$100,000 in scholarship money.
