MOMENT IN HISTORY

“Suddenly we heard a shell with its strange, dying whistle pass through the air. Then I said to my wife, ‘Maud, this is not maneuvers.’ I sprang out of bed and rushed to the radio. Sure enough, it was war! The announcer kept shouting in a nervous, breathless voice, ‘Pearl Harbor is being bombed. This is war, no fooling -- this is not maneuvers — it is the real McCoy.’”

-From the Dec. 7, 1941, diary entry of American Legion Department of Hawaii Vice Commander A.A. Kempa, who recorded efforts local Legionnaires made amid the chaos and destruction of the Pearl Harbor bombing that pushed the United States into World War II. That morning, Kempa wrote, he helped organize a team of 40 Legionnaires to fight fires burning all over. Legionnaires also helped direct traffic, assist with the wounded and calmed panicking citizens as the city was blacked out, under martial law
