## FALL

- ★ Gifts to the Yanks—Visit early or mid-October for sizes, wrap gifts and deliver in December with treats.
- ★ Children's Homes Christmas Gift—Collect money at a meetings, and send to Department. Auxiliary will deliver and gives the Legion Family credit.
- ★ Distribute Halloween Safety brochures and coloring books to schools.
- ★ Veteran's in the Classroom—read books that talk about the Military. Teach flag etiquette and flag folding guidelines.

## WINTER

- ★ Oratorical—make yourself familiar with the program. Ask Department how you can assist. Set up a meeting with the school informing them about this scholarship program. (Speech teachers are a good resource)
- ★ Special Olympic Winter Games at Galena (February) helpers and huggers are needed.
- ★ Boys State / Girls State / Youth Police Program—set up a meeting with the school to talk about these programs. Ask the students who attended the year before to share their experience. Communicate with the Posts, Units, Squadrons and Riders on how to help get sponsors.

## SPRING

- ★ Special Olympics—Volunteers are needed for all areas. Need timers, huggers, color guards, food donations, food helpers, etc.
- ★ Boys State / Girls State / Youth Police Program—talk about the upcoming summer programs. Help get these applications turned in.
- ★ Veteran's Walks for Legion Programs—i.e: (*Legacy Scholarship Fund, NEF, Children's Miracle Network*) and other charities for veterans.
- ★ Legion Baseball—get information to the schools.
- ★ Post Consolidated Reports—POSTS need to fill them out and send them in.

## SUMMER

- ★ Special Olympic-Summer Games/Hospitality tent—need tent donations, volunteers for food prep, set-up and take down, food donations, and hospitality helpers.
- ★ Have a Global Messenger visit to tell about what Special Olympics means to them.

- ★ State Tennis for Special Olympics (August)
- ★ Boys State / Girls State / Youth Police Program—ask how you can volunteer.
- ★ Legion Baseball—Support the teams by attending.

### PROGRAMS YEAR ROUND

- ★ The American Legion Centennial Celebrations—plan an event in your community. Support and attend neighboring centennial events already planned.
- ★ American Legion Riders—Support the Legacy Scholarship. Run with the Riders on a local run or ride in the Legacy Run to National Convention.
- National Emergency Fund (NEF)—Prepare: What to do Before, During and After a disaster. Packets available at Department. A good reminder for a member to keep up their membership as this program only assists current paid members.
- ★ Temporary Financial Assistance (TFA)—a program that gives grants to assist a veterans minor children. - ★ Boy Scouts—there are many badges, scholarships and awards available. Ask your local troop leaders how you can help the local scouters.
- ★ Children's Miracle Network (CMN)— April is Children & Youth Month—however the Legion family can support children and youth by raising funds year round to benefit their local Children's Miracle Network hospitals.
- ★ Blood Donor—Contact the Red Cross to host a Blood Drive. Legionnaires participate by giving blood and reporting it to their posts so you can mark the donation on the annual Consolidated Posts Reports. - ★ Pillow Case program for Pre-deployments—Ask how you can volunteer to help with making the pillow cases for our service men and women and their families during a pre-deployment. Donations for supplies are always needed.

## The Post, District and Division Children & Youth Chairman's Responsibility

The Post Children and Youth Chairman has four major responsibilities assistance, leadership, cooperation and reporting.

- Assistance— The chairman acquaints himself with various sources of assistance for children within his community, and assists families in securing such aid. He/She uses post funds to help children in emergencies or may call upon the Department or National Organization.
- Leadership— The chairman, with the approval and support of his commander, can devise projects for the benefit of children needed in his community. He/She interprets the Children and Youth program to the membership of his post and uses the brochure calendar as a guideline for his/her program.
- Cooperation— The post chairman cooperates with other agencies and organizations in the interest of children to avoid duplication of effort and to provide more service to children by pooling resources. He/She serves on boards and committees of established community agencies providing services to children.
- Reporting— Every post is expected to make a report on its Children and Youth work during the year. Complete the C & Y section of the Post Consolidated Report and remind your Adjutant to mail the completed form to Department Headquarters. The Department and National report is submitted to the United States Congress. In addition, the chairman should make periodic reports to the membership and the general public.

An active Children & Youth Chairman in each post and unit has long been an objective of the National Commission on Children & Youth. The Post Children & Youth Chairman is the keystone of the Children & Youth Program. This chairman is a member of one of the largest voluntary corps in this country who work with our young people. It is estimated he or she is one of 50,000 volunteer members of The American Legion and its affiliated organizations taking an active role in giving life and meaning to our Children & Youth Programs.

### 2020-2021 Children & Youth Program Highlights

### 1. SPECIAL OLYMPICS

"Let me win, but if I cannot, let me be brave in the attempt." This is the oath taken by every Special Olympic athlete. And for those of us who have been involved in this program, they are all winners, and so are we. To watch these ial Olympics athletes give their all, overcoming all types of handicaps, and to watch the pride in accomplishment and the

joy on the faces of the winners makes your own heart swell with sympathetic pride and brings a tear of joy to the eyes. They still need help - as coaches, as huggers, to help with the games. Maybe your post can sponsor one of the events - the softball throw, softball bowling, horseback riding, gymnastics. The list is limited only by the facilities available and your enthusiasm. Each year the Department of Illinois furnishes a hospitality center for the athletes, their families and coaches. Each year this hospitality center gets more popular. We supply a large tent with tables, chairs, and snacks (cookies, watermelpopsicles, orange drink, relish & vegetable plates, etc.).

Last year we had over 200 Legion, Auxiliary, Juniors, SAL and Rider volunteers man the tent - and the money to pay for it. We spent over \$10,000.00. Please help us make this goal by sending in your contribution to the Department, designated for the Special Olympics program.

### PREVENTION OF TEENAGE SUICIDE

In the last 27 years, suicide among teenagers and young adults has grown from an occasional tragic incident into an epidemic killer. According to the statistics, the suicide rate for persons less than 21 has tripled since 1955. The fact children are taking their own lives should be

especially frightening for parents. Current data now shows suicide is the second leading cause of death among young persons. More frightening is the fact that the problem is growing, and few people know its extent.

#### MISSING CHILDREN

Every year many children are missing from their homes. Some are kidnapped, some are runaways, some are abducted by noncustodial parents. And at the end of each year, almost 10 percent of missing children cases remain unsolved. Recently, Congress passed legislation that will allow the National Crime Information Center to accept into its computer more specific information on missing persons such as blood type, dental records and scars. In addition, many police departments with parents permission are fingerprinting children with the parents retaining the fingerprints. This year The American Legion has made "Missing Children" one of its three main areas of concern. Each post should get the brochure from National and have a program, to which the community is invited, outlining the seriousness of the problem and what can be done about it.

#### **DRUG ABUSE**

Drug abuse is a problem in nearly every community. The degree of abuse and the substance used may vary, but you can be sure its there. Drugs are probably being abused in your school, in your neighborhood possibly even in your own home. The best way to stop drug abuse is by prevention. Its a simple concept, but it does require constant work to be Prevention requires a basic understanding and strong successful. commitment. If children grow up with love and security, can express themselves freely, are realistic and yet optimistic about their abilities, and can make sound decisions, they will probably never become dependent on drugs. For those working with young people, it means giving sound advice and guidance in making the choices young people face growing up. For communities, it means seeing that young people receive the kinds of attention and experiences that can help them grow without a desire for drugs. Each post should enlist the aid of local agencies and present programs to parents on what they need to know about drug abuse. Work with your local schools and with other agencies that share your concerns.

### 5. CHILDREN'S MIRACLE NETWORK

Since 1997, The American Legion Family has been working together to support their local Children's Miracle Network affiliated children's hospitals with funding to assist with the treatment of children in need of medical expenses.

One hundred percent of all funds raised with in any Department remains within that Department for treatment of our children. The participating hospitals in Illinois are: St. John's Hospital, Springfield; Southern Illinois University School of Medicine, Springfield; Lurie Children's Hospital, Chicago; and Children's Hospital of Illinois, Peoria. Specialty items are



provided to Posts, Units, & Squadrons free of charge to use as a fund-raiser. There are Miracle Balloons & Flag Icon Cards. Perhaps these can be sold at the Post Homes, County fairs, Community Centers or local businesses. Contact CMN hospital closest to you.

### OPERATION MILITARY KIDS PILLOW CASE PROJECT



For the past six years, in Illinois, C&Y has been involved in a program called Operation Military Kids Pillow Case Project it gives a little bit of home to our Military families facing deployment. We have a team that goes to deployments they make picture pillow cases for soldiers leaving.

We give one to each family member in the picture so everyone gets someone to hug each night. It is truly a heartwarming "Legion Family" Project. Sadly Troops are still deploying so donations are needed for ink and transfer sheets (remember to earmark "OMK" in the memo section of your check). So far we have made over 17,000 pillow cases.
